In the heavy engagement which followed the German fleet, according to a report issued by the German Admiralty, sank the British battleship Warspite, the British battle cruisers

Queen Mary and Indefatigable, two

armored cruisers, believed to be of the

Achilles type, and a large number of warships of smaller tonnage. Several other British battleships are reported to have been damaged, including the

battleship Marlborough, which was struck by a torpedo.

The German losses are announced as the battleship Pommern, sunk by a torpedo; the cruiser Wiesbaden, sent to the bottom by gunfire; the protected cruiser Frauenlob, reported missing, and several torpedo boats, which did not return to port.
